
THE PROBLEM

 - Family structures



HOMICIDE DEMOGRAPHICS




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




What is S-NET?

- A **FRAMEWORK** that connects all programs, groups, organizations, and individuals whose work helps to address issues of violent crime in Peoria.
- A NETWORK of community resources for reducing gun violence.
- A **SYSTEM** of connected resources that support neighborhood safety.
- S-NET **PROFILES** identify provider service descriptions and contacts.
- S-NET **SUPPORTS** existing and potential violence prevention service providers to connect and leverage resources.

- Assists in community-wide distribution of related information and materials
- Uses technology to alert, connect, and inform members
