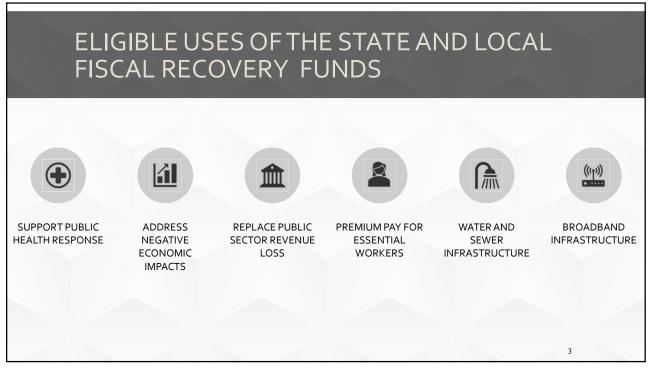


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FISCAL RECOVERY FUND FUNDING OBJECTIVES

- Support urgent COVID-19 response efforts to continue to decrease spread of the virus and bring the pandemic under control
- Replace lost public sector revenue to strengthen support for vital public services and help retain jobs
- Support immediate economic stabilization for households and businesses
- Address systemic public health and economic challenges that have contributed to the inequal impact of the pandemic

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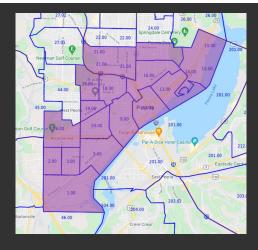
EQUITY-FOCUSED SERVICES

- Additional flexibility for the hardest-hit communities and families to address health disparities, invest in housing, address educational disparities, and promote healthy childhood environments
- Broadly applicable to Qualified Census Tracts, other disproportionately impacted areas, and when provided by Tribal governments

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EQUITY-FOCUSED SERVICES

- · Address health disparities
 - Community health workers and public benefits navigators
 - Lead paint remediation
 - Community violence intervention programs
- Housing and neighborhoods
 - Persons experiencing homelessness
 - · Affordable housing development
 - Housing vouchers, residential counseling, navigation assistance

- Educational disparities
 - New/expanded early learning services
 - Expanded resources for high-poverty school districts
 - Tutoring and afterschool programs
- Promoting healthy childhood environments
 - New/expanded high quality childcare
 - Home visiting programs for families with young children
 - Services for child welfare-involved families

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INELIGIBLE USES

- Changes that reduce net tax revenue must not be offset with American Rescue Plan Funds
- Extraordinary payments into a pension fund are a prohibited use of this funding. Under Treasury's interpretation, a "deposit" is distinct from a "payroll contribution," which occurs when employers make payments into pension funds on regular intervals for employees whose wages are an eligible use
- Rainy day funds or financial reserve deposits
- Funding debt service payments, legal settlements, or judgements

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2021 FISCAL RECOVERY FUNDS USE

- · Lost revenue calculation for Peoria \$20,561,566
- \$10,301,585 of Fiscal Recovery Funds were used in 2021 to cover revenue losses for the City.
- Funds were used to offset Police and Fire Salaries
- **\$36,788,391** of unspent funds.
- Funds must be appropriated by 12/31/2024 and spent by 12/31/2026.

- Public Works requested to carry over \$870,000 in sidewalk spending for 2023 from 2022
- The street light projects for Prospect Road and SW Adams remain
- Smart Street Lighting Pilot would be \$500,000 for 2023, coupled with an anticipated \$2,500,000 DCEO Grant
- Mill and Overlay costs have increased, MLK up \$300,000 and Gale up \$500,000
- Wisconsin Avenue still at \$2,000,000
- New project: A sewer in NW Peoria along War Memorial Drive \$1,600,000

2024-2026 FISCAL RECOVERY FUNDS

- With the proposed changes for 2023, **\$10,846,272** would remain to be spent in 2024-2026.
- The intergovernmental agreement with Peoria County for the Health Equity Fund calls for funding \$600,000 per year in 2024 and 2025.
- **\$9,646,272** left to allocate for 2024-2026.
- Should Council wish to continue with Neighborhood, Economic Development and Violence Prevention spending, \$3,181,802 would be available for infrastructure.
